Modern Philosophy presents the basic tools of philosophy and some principles and positions. The immediate goal is to encourage students to grapple with the ideas rather than passing their eyes over the texts. It combines readings from primary sources and study questions which ask students to reconstruct an argument or position from the text, or draw connections among the readings, which makes for a better classroom experience and permits higher-level discussions.
